6 Proven Ways to Avoid an IRS Audit!

April 18th is the deadline for the filing of personal income tax returns. With the sheer volume of returns filed, the IRS does not manually review each and every return. Most tax returns are processed by IRS computers. These computers are programmed to watch for anything out of the ordinary, anything that strays too far from statistical norms. An item that falls outside the norm may be "flagged", increasing the likelihood that a return will be audited. A flagged return will then be manually reviewed by an IRS employee to determine if there's an actual need for an audit. Being flagged doesn't guarantee you'll be audited, but it does mean the IRS will probably take a closer look at your return.

Here are 6 of the most common things the IRS looks for. Avoid these and your chance of an audit will plummet.

- 1. **Unreported Income** If you file a return, but fail to report income you've received, trouble won't be far behind. Report all interest, capital gains, dividends or miscellaneous income you receive, not just your W-2 income. Remember: every entity that sends you a W-2 or 1099 also sends a copy to the IRS.
- 2. **Round Numbers** It is unlikely that your investment returns were exactly \$1,500 or that your mortgage interest deduction was exactly \$12,000, or that you drove exactly 9,000 miles for your job/business. Too many round numbers on a return triggers the IRS that something fishy might be going on.
- 3. **Discrepancies Between State and Federal Returns** Believe it or not, the state and federal revenue departments do communicate with each other. The process is slow, but if they discover discrepancies between the numbers you reported to the state and the numbers you report to the federal, you can expect further inquiry.
- 4. **Economic Reality** The IRS has detailed statistics and empirical data on economic averages. They know roughly what someone in your line of work earns and what expenses and deductions are typical. Anything deviating too far from these economic averages could bring your return under the spotlight.
- 5. **Drastic Changes in Income** Most people do not have incomes that swing wildly up and down, and the IRS knows it. If your income shows significant unexplained fluctuations from year to year, it can cause the IRS to question the accuracy of the your return. In such cases it's a (Continued on pg. 2)

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good idea to add an explanation to your return. So if you lost your job and lived on savings, or if you got a handsome promotion, or if you're in a profession where your income can fluctuate significantly (sales) put it in writing on your return. Sure, it's none of the IRS's business, but it may alleviate an auditor's initial suspicions.

6. **High Itemized Deductions** - Go ahead. Claim each and every deduction you qualify for. There's nothing wrong with that. Just be aware that anything too far outside the averages can trigger your return for a closer look. And make sure you adhere to the IRS rules for what is and isn't a qualified deduction. Keep good records, and avoid getting "creative" (as some do) with your definition of medical expenses or charitable contributions.


